1. General Readings:

- a. Become familiar with all newspapers (daily and weekly, black and white, metropolitan and community, etc.) by reading regularly in a systematic fashion.
- b. Become familiar with the local phone book, especially information on city and headings under bookstores, schools, universities, social service organizations, government listings, etc. Spend at least 2 hours reading and taking notes from the phone book.

2. General Research Manuals:

3. Maps:

- a. Get regional, state and city map from local gas stations.
- b. Go to city hall and purchase detailed area maps of the city dealing with specific institutions (model cities, school systems, city council areas, etc.)

4. Sources of information: Go to the following places and collect as much material and information as possible.

- a. Chamber of Commerce (info on ruling class, industries, local politics).
- b. AFL-CIO (info on establishment of labor.)
- c. Black Studies Programs in local colleges (info on Black Culture & Community Organizations.)
- d. Main library (info on city usually in special collection, sometimes located in City Hall.)
- e. Clipping file of local major daily newspapers (info on all major issues facing community over at least 5 years).

5. Family: If you are at home or near blood relatives, interview (for at least half an hour) everyone about all aspects of the city and their activities so you will know what contacts, etc. you have.

6. Bookstores: Make a list of all bookstores in the city, make a phone survey to locate political materials (ask for specific political education titles) and go to all that are relevant, talk to the manager.
