We have compiled this research tool to enable as many people as possible to turn the tide and fully set the record straight.

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"Factors Affecting Marital Status Among Negroes." This is Cox's Ph.D. dissertation, completed in 1938.

"The Negro's Quest for Democracy." This is largely a study of protest movements of Negroes in the U. S. with emphasis on the significance of nonviolence. Completed in 1963.
