Brother Malcolm X gave a basic answer(June 28,1964):

"When we send our children to school in this country they learn nothing about us other than that we used to be cotton-pickers. Every little child going to school thinks his grandfather was a cottonpicker. Why, your grandfather was Nat Turner; your grandfather was Toussaint L'Ouverture ; your grandfather was Hannibal. Your grandfather was some of the greatest Black people who walked on this earth. It was your grandfather's hands who forged civilization and it was your grandmothers hands who rocked the cradle of civilization. But the textbooks tell our children nothing about the great contributions of Afro-Americans to the growth and development of this country."
