Dr. Alkalimat will focus on the past three decades of the Black movement for Civil Rights and social justice, beginning with Malcolm X's famous 1964 speech on "The Ballot or the Bullet." His narrative will examine the swings back and forth between the two poles of reform and the revolution in Black political thought and struggle to the present day.

Dr. Alkalimat is also on the staff of Peoples College in Chicago, and is a senior editor of Twenty-first Century Publications, whose Introduction to Afro-American Studies: A People College Primer, now in its fourth edition, has been adopted for use in over two hundred college and university courses.
