Leading Black Scholars Discuss Research.on

MALCOLMX

The life and leadership of Malcolm X is the central focus of a major international conference being held at the Borough of Manhattan Community College (BMCC) in New York City, November 1 - 4, 1990. This is the most important conference to discuss Malcolm X and evaluate his role in history.

The opening plenary session is organized around presentations by John Henry Clarke, C. Eric Lincoln, Margaret Burroughs, and Alex Haley, all leading Black scholars who began publishing works on Malcolm X in the 1960's and 70's. Their presentations at this Thursday night plenary (November 1st) will discuss their publications and how they think research should be carried out today.

Greetings of welcome to the conference will be given by the President of BMCC Augusta Kappner and Dr. Betty Shabazz, the widow of Malcolm X/El Hajj Malik El Shabazz. They will follow rituals of blessing from African tradition, Islam, and Black liberation theology. A poem will be read by an African American poet.

Throughout the conference there will be a display of books by publishers of Malcolm X's works as well as related texts in Black studies. A wide range of organizations will be present to discuss many of the concrete programs of action that make up the Black liberation and progressive movements in the 1990's.

The conference is designed to bring together committed students and teachers, activists from struggles in the community, and generally Black people who admire and respect what Malcolm stood for and want to do something about rebuilding the movement. Everyone is welcome!




