



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An invitation to study MALCOLM X

This project began in 1985 with a special issue of *Black Liberation Month News*, 75,000 of these documents have been distributed free throughout the USA, as well as in England, France, Germany, Belgium, Nigeria, Tanzania, South Africa, Trinidad and Tobago, Jamaica, Haiti, Cuba Puerto Rico, Canada, and the Peoples Republic of China.

In 1987 Abdul Alkalimat along with other Malcolm X scholars, including James Cone and William Sales, formed a work group hosting a series of three annual symposia at Queens College, Flushing, New York, on May 19th (the anniversary of Malcolm's birth).

Studies on Malcolm X continued into the '90s when the overall movement of fighters for Black liberation gathered for the major international conferences on Malcolm X, held at the Borough of Manhattan Community College, New York City in 1990 and 1991 —
