

Remember MALCOLM

A PROPOSAL FOR ACTION

Historical experience is the source of all knowledge, theoretical and practical. Often it is possible to find in the life of a leader a prism through which to evaluate the historical experiences of a generation and a movement. This is a proposal to dedicate 1990 to the study and celebration of Malcolm X. Our main purpose is to reevaluate the fight for Black liberation, and to place proper emphasis on the importance of Malcolm X as the historical catalyst who sparked a fundamental ideological shift in the Black liberation movement.

The 1960s was a dynamic decade of struggle during which the radical tendencies of the civil rights movement and the Black nationalist movement converged into a Black liberation movement. This Black liberation movement began to call into question the fundamental postulates and practices of the politics and culture of the USA. Black liberation consciousness sparked a paradigm shift through Black studies, Black liberation theology, Black art, and the deeply mass based Black is beautiful movement.

Malcolm X was a mass leader who maintained his integrity through his leadership in the Nation of Islam, upholding Black nationalism and Islam, as well as through his transformation into a panafrican internationalist and a Sunni Imam. 25 years ago in 1965, Malcolm was assassinated. Shortly thereafter his major works were published: *The Autobiography of Malcolm X*, and *Malcolm X Speaks*. There has been a consistent focus on Malcolm X, to discuss his impact and to celebrate his greatness, but not nearly as much as there should be.

This is a proposal to stimulate groups and institutions of all kinds to focus on Malcolm X in 1990. We hope that you read this brochure, think about how it can be applied in your planning process, and act decisively. We look forward to hearing from you.





Plan a Petition to Rename a Street after Malcolm

We propose that a committee be formed in every city to select a major street for a name change, and initiate a petition drive aimed at their city council to name the street after Malcolm X or Malik Shabazz.

Commission Local Artists to Paint a Mural of Malcolm Images

The visual image is a power tool of cultural expression, and none is more dramatic than a public mural done in large proportions on the side of a building in a community where Malcolm might have lived and worked. The image of Malcolm X was the largest image on the famous Wall of Respect (Chicago 1967, photo by Robert Sengstacke), and has been put on hundreds of murals since then.

Black American Literature Forum

A special issue is being planned on the theme of Malcolm X and the cannons of African American literature. The special call is for critical studies on *The Autobiography of Malcolm X*, as 1990 is its 25th anniversary year. Also, writers are encouraged to write their own short autobiographical accounts of how the thought and action of Malcolm X made an impact on their lives and their approach to the literary tasks of reading and writing.

The Autobiography of Malcolm X is a useful role model for the masses of Black youth faced with the ominous dangers of being underclass and homeless. Further a proper reading of this text invites comparison with the raw authenticity of the slave narratives, and the sweeping autobiographical syntheses of WEB DuBois, Langston Hughes, and Maya Angelou.
